HISTORY OF THE VALLEY

Once known as the Arizona Territory, the Valley of the Sun contained one of the main routes to the gold fields in California. Although gold and silver were discovered in some Arizona rivers and mountains during the 1860's, copper had gained the greatest economic importance by 1877, when the territorial capitol was moved to the City of Phoenix.

A miner, prospector, and saloon owner named Jack Swilling and his friend, Darrel Duppa, are known as the founders of Phoenix. Fascinated with the ancient Hohokam Indian canal networks, Swilling realized they could be used to bring Salt River water to the valley.

By 1868 more than fifty pioneers had built homes in, what was known as, Pumkinville where Swilling had planted the gourds along the canal banks. Duppa presented the name of Phoenix as related to the story of the rebirth of the mythical bird born from the ashes. The origin being the birth of a city, rebuilt on the ancient Hohokam canal systems dating back to 700-1400 AD.

Once it was connected to the Southern Pacific and Santa Fe Railroads, Phoenix became a trading and processing center. With the completion of the Roosevelt Dam bringing electricity and water to the Valley of the Sun, Phoenix had grown to over 11,000 citizens when Arizona became a state on Valentine's Day of 1912.

By the time the United States entered WWII, one of the 7 natural wonders of the world, the Grand Canyon, had become a national park, Route 66 was completed and Pluto had been discovered at the Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff.



The post-war years saw the city grow more rapidly, as many men who had trained in the military installations in the valley returned, bringing their families.

In 1948, Motorola built its first plant in Phoenix which marked the beginning of the high-tech industry in Arizona. Phoenix's population grew to 106,000 in the early 1950s with the construction boom lead by the widespread use of air-conditioning.

The valley grew in size with the annexation of surrounding land and master-planned communities were built while new industries were welcomed by the business community.

Today, the Valley has over 4.5 Million residents spread over 25 different cities.

The land that would become the city of Phoenix was first inhabited by the Hohokam people around 700 AD. The Hohokam created 135mi irrigation canals allowing the cultivation of crops in the desert climate.

THE VALLEY OF THE SUN

The Phoenix Valley was the floor of a shallow, ancient sea 1.8 billion years ago.

Phoenix is the only state capital with a population of more than 1 million residents.

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18 million years ago, a volcano erupted in the Superstition Mountains, just 23 miles east of downtown Phoenix.

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WEATHER CLIMATE

Arizona is known as the "Valley of the Sun" for a reason. Enjoyable and warm for majority of the year, the average temperatures range from 65-85 degrees from October through April.

Summers are exceptionally hot and dry in Arizona, with temperatures usually in the 90°F (32.2°C) to 120°F (48.9°C) zone. The southern desert occasionally registers temperatures above 125°F (51.7°C), while the average high temperatures reach a peak of 97°F (36.1°C) in July.

Arizona receives an average of 13" (330mm) of scanty rainfall in the year, with a peak during late summer. The mountainous region receives above 20" (508mm), while the southern desert sees extended periods of little to no precipitation.

The best time to visit Arizona is in the autumn season from September to November when the temperatures scale down from the peak of summer. Day highs are in the comfortable 65°F (18.3°C) to 85°F (29.4°C) range, and the nights fare even better.



UI MONUMENT VALLEY

Monument Valley, otherwise known as the Valley of Rocks, is home to the Native American population of the Navajos. Located about 3 hours away from the Grand Canyon, the Valley has sandstone rock formations that have been developed over time and reach up to 400 to 1,000 feet above the valley's level. When visiting Monument Valley, you have several accommodation options, including hotels, camping, and glamping.

02 GLEN CANYON REC AREA

Encompassing an area of over 1.25 million acres of land and water, the Glen Canyon National Recreation Area spans from the Orange Cliffs of southern Utah to Lee's Ferry in Arizona. Glen Canyon Dam, a part of the recreation area, was constructed to harness the Colorado River's power and provide water and energy to the people of the west.

O3 CANYON DE CHELLY

In the northeastern part of Arizona, Canyon de Chelly is a worthwhile destination to venture to. Compared to the others, this monument and the entire Arizona destination is not too well-known, but the eye-catching vistas and remarkable geological formations are still there. The sandstone walls rise to 1,000 feet, and the area gives a captivating insight into the life of the Navajo people, who still inhabit the location.

04 HAVASU FALLS

Located near the village of Supai, Havasu Falls is the waterfall of Havasu Creek. Flowing through the Havasupai land in the Havasu Canyon, it is also part of the Grand Canyon. It falls for 100 feet (30 meters) into a turquoise, blue pool. If you're on vacation in Arizona and want to witness something memorable, then this is where you need to visit!

35 SAGUARO NATIONAL PARK

Saguaro National Park is located in Tucson and is home to the nation's largest cacti. It is a must for any Tucson itinerary! As North America's largest cactus, the oldest saguaros can live up to 200 years while growing and weighing 7 tons. Saguaro NP is home to majestic plants and extinct animal species found only in a small portion of the US.

D6 BEAVER FALLS TRAIL

Beaver Falls Trail is a 24.5 mile heavily trafficked, out and back trail located close to Supai. It is rated as a difficult trail. You're in the vicinity of many other waterfalls, including famous Havasu Falls, but head this route to Beaver Falls to be sure to opt for another fantastic site. This is one of the best hikes and places to visit in Arizona and is surely one for the Arizona bucket list!

07 HORSESHOE BEND

One of the most famous landscapes in the United States is that of Horseshoe Bend near Page, Arizona. Sometimes referred to as the East Rim of the Grand Canyon, this sight most definitely deserves its own place on this list! The scenic Arizona landmark is an example of an entrenched meander that was formed around 5-6 million years ago by the Colorado River.

D8 VERMILION CLIFFS

Located in northern Coconino County, you will find one of the best places to visit in Arizona, Vermilion Cliffs National Monument. It is also home to the famous White Pocket in Arizona. Established in 2000, this natural beauty protects the Paria Plateau, Vermilion Cliffs, Coyote Buttes, and Paria Canyon. It sprawls out over 293,000 acres and one of the biggest attractions there is 'the Wave'.

D9 SNOWBOWL NEAR FLAGSTAFF

Take in the dramatic scenery of Northern Arizona from a bird's eye view on the Arizona Gondola. As the lift travels up to 11,500 feet, you can see the cinder cone volcanic field, the red rocks in Sedona, and as far as the Grand Canyon on a clear day.

OU.S. ROUTE 66

Popularly known as Route 66 or the Mother Road, it holds an elevated place in American consciousness and tells diverse stories of a mobile nation on the road. Discover this shared heritage through historic places you can still experience today, which are reminders of our past and the influence the automobile has had on our lives and nation today.

MOGOLLON RIM

Visit the Mogollon Rim, near Flagstaff, AZ, for scenic views and outdoor recreation including hiking, horseback riding, rock-climbing, hunting, fishing, and boating. Stretching 200 miles from Yavapai County to New Mexico, the Mogollon Rim provides breathtaking views overlooking an expansive forest of pine trees. The rim is a true geological wonder hosting sedimentary, volcanic and metamorphic rock dating back to the Precambrian era.

2 BARRINGER METEORITE CRATER

This is a truly fascinating piece of land. Scientists believe that approximately 50,000 years ago a massive meteor blazed through Earth's atmosphere and struck this area with the force of two and a half million tons of dynamite. Standing at the edge of this giant crater, which is nearly a mile wide, is an experience you won't soon forget.

The Arizona Cardinals are a professional football team based in Phoenix. They were founded in 1898 in Chicago, Illinois. They currently play at the University of Phoenix Stadium. They have never won a Super Bowl, but have had their stadium host a couple of them, including Super Bowl XLIX in 2015. They play in the National Football Conference's West Division.



The Phoenix Suns play in the NBA's Pacific Division and are the only team not from California in that division. They are also the only men's professional sports team left that do not brand themselves as an Arizona team, only from the city of Phoenix. They were founded in 1968 and play their home games in Talking Stick Resort Arena. They have appeared in two NBA Finals, and lost both.



The Arizona Coyotes are a professional hockey league team based in Tempe. They play their home games at the ASU Multi-Purpose Arena. They have never played in a Stanley Cup Final. They moved to Arizona in 1996 from Winnipeg, Manitoba, originally named 'The Jets'. They play in the Western Conference's Pacific Division.



ARIZONA DIAMONDBACKS

The Arizona Diamondbacks are a professional baseball team based in Phoenix, Arizona. They play their home games at Chase Field. They were founded in 1998 as an expansion team in the National League's West Division of the MLB. They became the fastest expansion team to win a World Series title (four seasons) when they beat three-time defending champ the New York Yankees in 2001.



The Arizona Rattlers are a professional indoor American football team based in Phoenix, Arizona. They are currently members of the Indoor Football League (IFL). The Rattlers were founded in 1992 as an expansion team in the Arena Football League and were the third oldest active franchise in the AFL until their departure in 2016. They play their home games





PHOENIX MERCURY

The Phoenix Mercury are an American professional basketball team based in Phoenix, Arizona, playing in the Western Conference in the Women's National

Basketball Association (WNBA). The team was founded before the league's inaugural 1997 season began; it is one of the eight original franchises. The Mercury has qualified for the WNBA Playoffs in fifteen of its twenty-four years in Phoenix.

HIKING TRAILS HARIZONA ONE FOR EACH MONTH

O DEVILS BRIDGE TRAIL

TOP

January: This is a 3.9-mile out-an-back trail with an elevation gain of 521 ft. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 1 h 39 min to complete. It leads to the area's largest natural sandstone arch (that you can actually walk across), and it's even more beautiful covered in a thick layer of snow. *Moderate

O2 BRIGHT ANGEL TRAIL February: Enjoy this 15.3-mile out-and-back trail that

February: Enjoy this 15.5-mile out-and-back trail that has an elevation gain of 4,478 ft. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 9h 6min to complete. Bright Angel Trail is the most popular hike in the canyon, so it only makes sense to tackle it during the least busy season. *Hard

03 CATHEDRAL ROCK TRAIL

March: Explore this 1.2-mile out-and-back trail near Sedona with an elevation gain of 741 ft. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 1 h 8 min to complete. The one-mile hike is short and sweet, but highly technical, so it isn't recommended for beginners. Seasoned hikers, however, will love the expansive views of the surrounding red rock landscape! *Hard

O4 GRAND FALLS VIEW TRAIL April: Enjoy this 1.1-mile out-and-back trail near Leupp.

April: Enjoy this 1.1-thile out-and-back train hear Leupp, Arizona that has an elevation gain of 187 ft. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 31 min to complete. As the winter snow melts, it feeds into the falls to create one of the most powerful cascades you'll ever see. The «hike» - if you can even call it that - is only about half a mile from the parking area to the waterfall, so it's perfect for all ages. *Easy

05 BRIGHT ANGEL POINT TRAIL May: Discover this 0.9-mile trail with an elevation gain

May: Discover this 0.9-mile trail with an elevation gain of 144 ft. Generally considered an easy route, it takes an average of 25 min to complete. Mid-may is when the North Rim officially opens to the public after its annual winter closure, so it's only fitting to celebrate with a quick and easy hike. *Easy

06 ROMERO CANYON TRAIL

June: Ity this 5.5-thile out-and-back trail hear catalina, Arizona with an elevation gain of 1,322 ft. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 58 min to complete. This is a series of shallow wading areas connected by gently trickling waterfalls. It's an out-andback trail, so you can cool off in the pools before trekking back the way you came. *Hard

07 RIBBON FALLS

July: Head out on this 16.8-mile out-and-back trail near North Rim, Arizona with an elevation gain of 5,380 ft. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 10 h 29 min to complete. Located on the west side of Bright Angel Creek on the North Kaibab Trail, it offers lush scenery and a 100-foot-plus waterfall that drops onto a distinct travertine mass. *Hard

08 BEAR CANYON TO SEVEN FALLS TRAIL

August: Head out on this 8.3-mile out-and-back trail near Tucson, Arizona with an elevation gain of 1,013 ft. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 3 h 26 min to complete. is a seven-tiered waterfall. It's an ideal respite from the oppressive desert heat, and there's plenty of space around the swimming area to relax and refuel with a picnic lunch. *Moderate

OG ASPEN NATURE LOLLIPOP TRAIL September: This is 2.7-mile loop trail near Flagstaff,

September: This is 2.7-mile loop trail near Hagstaff, Arizona with an elevation gain of 360 ft. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 1 h 9 min to complete. Beautiful aspen, spruce, and pine trees line the trail. This trail also happens to be one of the best fall hikes in the area due to the abundance of aspen groves. *Moderate

O TRANSEPT TRAIL

October: Get to know this 3.3-mile out-and-back trail near Sedona with an elevation gain of 541 ft. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 1 h 31 min to complete. This trail is rumored to be the spookiest trail in Arizona. What better than to hike Transept Trail in October! *Moderate

WEST FORK OF OAK CREEK TRAIL #108

November: Try this 6.5-mile out-and-back trail near Munds Park, Arizona that has an elevation gain of 564 ft. Considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 26 min to complete. This trail erupts in a gorgeous palette of autumnal hues this time of year. Unlike the aspens in Flagstaff, the trees here take on a variety of warm, seasonal colors. You definitely won't feel like you're in Arizona! *Moderate

2 CAMELBACK MOUNTAIN

December: A 2.5-mile out-and-back trail with an elevation gain of 1,420 ft. Generally considered a challenging route, it takes an average of 2 h 13 min to complete. It's a difficult hike, but the mild December climate makes it a bit more bearable. Plus, you'll get to see the Camelback Mountain Christmas tree - perhaps the quirkiest Arizona holiday tradition there is! *Hard





10 FUN FACTS ABOUT ARIZONA

Even Arizona natives may be surprised by some of these fun facts about our state Either way, here are 10 interesting tidbits you should know about Arizona—and 10 cool experiences you should definitely explore.

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There are 22 national parks and monuments in Arizona, with the Grand Canyon as one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World.

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Arizona boasts the largest percentage of its land designated as American Indian lands. There are 22 tribes in Arizona, the largest being the Navajo Nation.

The average state elevation is 4,000 feet (1,219 meters) above sea level. Arizona has 3,928 mountain peaks and summits. Twenty-six peaks top 10,000 feet (3,048 meters) in elevation. Humphrey's Peak is the highest point in Arizona with an elevation of 12,637 feet (3,852 meters).

Arizona does not observe daylight savings, however the Navajo Nation in northeastern Arizona does. Arizona remains on Mountain Standard Time year-round.

Arizona's Sonoran Desert is the only place on earth where the iconic saguaro cactus grows. It can grow up to 65ft high. Arizona has 31 state parks and natural areas preserving the state's natural, cultural and recreational resources.

The Arizona Trail is 800 miles long and is dedicated to hiking, mountain biking, horseback riding and cross-country skiing.

Two of the top rated waterfalls in the United States are located in Arizona: Grand Falls and Havasu Falls.

Arizona's most famous and now official nickname, "The Grand Canyon State" celebrates its most iconic feature, the Grand Canyon. Arizona is also known as the "Copper State" revealing its abundance in this mineral.

Phoenix is the 5th largest city in America with an estimated population of 1,680,992. It is located within the heart of the 10th largest metropolitan area in the country with an estimated population of 4,948,203. Phoenix is the most populous state capital in the United States.



OL GRAND CANYON

One of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World, northern Arizona's Grand Canyon puts the grandiosity of Mother Nature in perspective and serves as a window in to the region's geological and cultural past. Located in a remote part of Arizona roughly 80 miles from the closest towns, such as Flagstaff and Tuba City, you will have to visit the Grand Canyon Village, a historic town on the Southern rim built in 1901 when the Santa Fe railroad established a route and depot through the park.

02 KARTCHNER CAVERNS

Located in southern Arizona, about two-and-a-half hours from Phoenix, Kartchner Caverns State Park is home to the world's longest stalactite formation. Visitors take an underground guided tour of this cavern with about 2.5 miles of passages, to experience an amazing, hidden world, discovering the delicate ecosystem of limestone caves and the longest known "Soda Straw" stalactite on Earth. The site boasts a huge Discovery Center, which features interactive exhibits that explain how the cave was discovered, and how formations developed, as well as discussing geology, the bat population, and paleontology.

03 sedona

Vortex sites and outdoor destinations make for great hikes, walks and adventures. Here, you'll find resorts and spas, canyons and red rock formations. Bell Rock and Oak Creek Canyon are great hiking spots, and the dramatic architecture of the Chapel of the Holy Cross is a religious experience itself. Closer to town, museums and shops speak to the artist in all of us. If you are just passing through there is also a scenic drive to try.

04 ANTELOPE CANYON Antelope Canyon is a small slot canyon a few miles from

Antelope Canyon is a small slot canyon a few miles from Page and Lake Powell, is intimate and up close. You can touch its surrealistic beauty and feel the wind that has carved the undulating curves over the past 180 million years.

05 winslow

Best known for making an appearance in the lyrics of "Take it Easy" by the Eagles, Winslow has been one of the most important stops on Route 66 for decades. It's worth stopping by the Standin' On a Corner Park to hum the world-famous tune. If you have time to spend the night, try to book a room at the historic La Posada hotel, which has hosted people like Clark Gable and Amelia Earhart.

06 jerome

This former mining town is popular with tourists and populated by those whose talents (art, food, wine) are best suited for above-ground endeavors. Throw in the views, and you'll marvel at this town that clings to a mountainside in ways that seem to defy gravity.

07 HOOVER DAM

Be sure to set aside a few hours to four the Depressionera marvel that created it all. Visitors learn about the development of the West, life during the Depression, construction lingo of the time, even the workers' beloved black Lab. The adventurous can even add a helicopter ride or boat trip.

08 petrified forest National Park

Thickets of coniferous trees, some as big as 9 feet in diameter and 200 feet tall, once towered over floodplains of these 220,000 acres near Holbrook. Sometimes, when those trees fell, they got washed downstream and buried. Over time, dissolved silica replaced the trees' original wood tissue, slowly turning them to stone.

09 MONTEZUMA CASTLE

Tucked into the recess of a limestone cliff 90 feet above Beaver Creek, the Montezuma Castle National Monument is an incredibly well-preserved cliff dwelling that was inhabited by the Sinagua people until approximately 600 years ago. Visitors haven't been allowed to climb up to the five-story building since the 1950s, but you can get excellent views from the base of the cliff, where a short trail loops along the river and through a sycamore grove. A small museum can be found in the Visitor Center, and there is also a beautiful picnic area on the shore of the creek.

D TOMBSTONE

everyday life, one that draws visitors from all over the world. Re-enactments, museums and tours are big business here. The "Town Too Tough To Die" survives on its history. The O.K. Corral, site of that infamous gunfight, charges an adult admission of \$10 for reenactments.

CAMPGROUNDS OP NARIZONA

OI ORGAN PIPE CACTUS NATIONAL MONUMENT

In the far south of Arizona, near the Mexico border, Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument is an often overlooked gem. For anyone looking to get away and camp out under a star-filled sky in the desert, this is the place to come. The campground is surrounded by lush desert and views to the mountains. Due to its remote location, the campground rarely, if ever, fills up, even on weekends. The 208 sites are divided up into an area for RVs and a separate generator-free area for tents.

02 THE GRAND CANYON

03 GLEN CANYON NATIONAL RECREATION AREA

One of the more unique camping options in Arizona can be found along the shores of Lake Powell, just north of Page, in Glen Canyon National Recreation Area. The camping area is large and level, so there is plenty of room for you to pick a spot. Camping is free, but there is a fee to enter the park.

O5 LAKE HAVASU STATE PARK While beaches probably aren't what you picture when you think

This isn't a quiet nature retreat, it's for people looking for fun and action. The campsites have water and 50-amp electricity at each site, so you can run your air conditioner in your rig.

06 OAK CREEK CANYON

One of the highlights of Sedona is Oak Creek Canyon, where you'll also find three lovely campgrounds, Manzanita Campground, Cave Springs campground, and pine flat campground. Slide Rock State Park is just a short drive away, as are some of the best hikes in Sedona. All these campgrounds can be booked up to six months in advance on a rolling date basis.

07 CHIRICAHUA NATIONAL MONUMENT-BONITA CANYON

In southern Arizona, not far from the border with Mexico, Chiricahua National Monument protects a sky island, a small mountain range set apart from other mountains. The elevation at the Bonita Canyon Campground, which is at a lower elevation than much of the monument, is still well over 5,000 feet, meaning the temperatures are cooler, particularly at night, than the surrounding desert below. The campground itself is well forested, and campgrounds are spaced a good distance from each other, offering nature and privacy. All sites are reservable up to six months in advance on a rolling basis.

38 SPILLWAY CAMPGROUND

Set on the shores of Wood's Lake, Spillway Campground is small, cozy, and quaint, by camping standards. O LYNX CAMPGROUND
